Myocarditis Survivor Competes in IRONMAN World Championship in Kona, HI

Hamish Deery of Melbourne, Australia is a family man, friend, business executive and was in the best shape of his life when myocarditis changed his life. Hamish was training for and competing in Ironman races across Australia when on the day of the Long-Course Championships in 2012 he was suddenly struck with myocarditis. His heart was only pumping at 50% but his brilliant team of physicians were able to diagnose and begin treatment for his case of myocarditis. Hamish then faced a challenging 5 months of uncertainty and recovery but on March 28th, 2013 Hamish was cleared by his doctor and began training again; this time "to inspire, to fundraise, to show anything is possible".

On October 11th, Hamish competed in the Ironman World Championship in Kona, HI. To go from a diagnosis

of myocarditis to competing in the world's ultimate feat of athleticism is the utmost proof that "anything is possible". Throughout Hamish's training, he was able to raise \$2,000 for the Myocarditis Foundation from friends and family who supported him in his recovery and training. Below are Hamish's words on why he chose to pursue his life-long goal no matter the circumstances.

"For me, sport provides a metaphor for life. I have always been inspired by the everyday sportsman, rather than the elite. Those "everyday heroes" who have the courage to stand at the start line despite the prospect of failure, and to commence on a journey to explore their limits and define their own success.

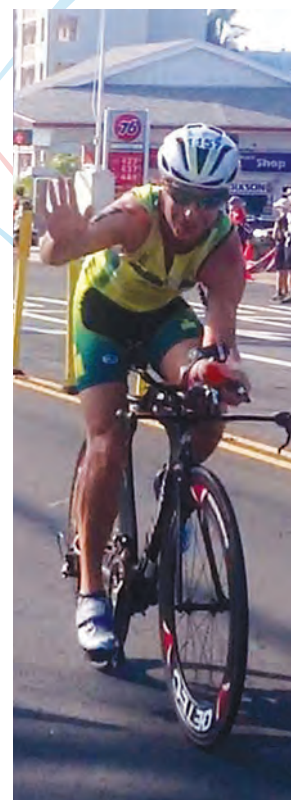
When I was diagnosed with Myocarditis, and I faced the prospect of no longer participating in triathlons, I decided that if I was given the opportunity again, that more than ever I needed to live those values, even if I needed to redefine my own limits and success. Part of that was dedicating my racing to raising awareness of Myocarditis.

I was very fortunate that I was still able to compete and progress to qualifying for the World Championships. It gave me a wider platform, and it was a humbling experience. But more importantly, it re-enforced the metaphors I see in sport and life: to participate, to examine our limits, define our own success, while being part of a community that values those who have the courage to finish last as much as those who finish first."

Hamish finished his Ironman race in 10 hour 23mins, was 131 in his division (out of around 360) and placed 631 overall.

Congratulations and thank you to Hamish for proving "anything is possible" and giving hope to myocarditis survivors across the world. You are an inspiration and we are honored to share your story.

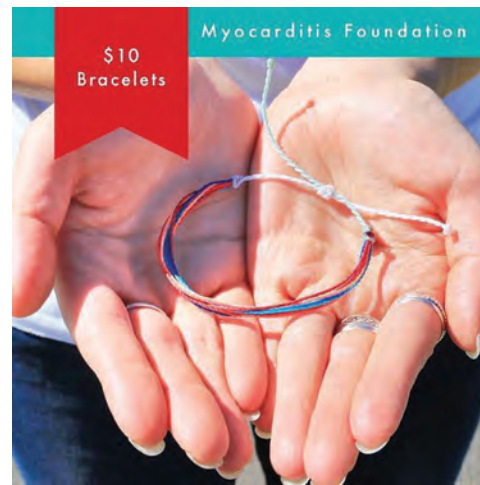

Remembering Our Mother, Kamaljit Badwal

Kamaljit Kaur Badwal, our beloved mother was born in Punjab, India on October 6th, 1952, the eldest to four brothers. In 1967 at the age of 14, her parents migrated the family to London, UK. Here she attended Mayfield Girls School; married at 25 and later had 4 children.

Kamaljit had a real zest for life; dreams to travel the world, a lover of fashion, a highly skilled embroidery designer, having worked on gown's for the royal family, an amateur Indian classical dancer and an avid fan of Indian cinema. She was a loving daughter, sister and mother; she had her whole life ahead of her.

On Saturday June 29th 1991, all of this was suddenly snatched from her. In the early hours of that day, her husband discovered her lying on her bedroom floor not breathing. On arrival of the paramedics, she was pronounced dead, leaving behind a devastating and empty hole in her family's lives. Kamaljit left behind two daughters, aged 12 and 9, and a 6-year-old son. She was 38 years old.

The post-mortem report indicated cause of death from a rare heart condition called Myocarditis, a condition that strikes without warning, shattering so many lives.

The following years we had a lot of growing up to do but we

believe it's time we shared our story, we believe it's time to share the devastating impact myocarditis can have on families and friends.

As a family we had never heard of Myocarditis until our mother's untimely passing. Together we have learned that this condition, despite being rare, has affected thousands across the globe.

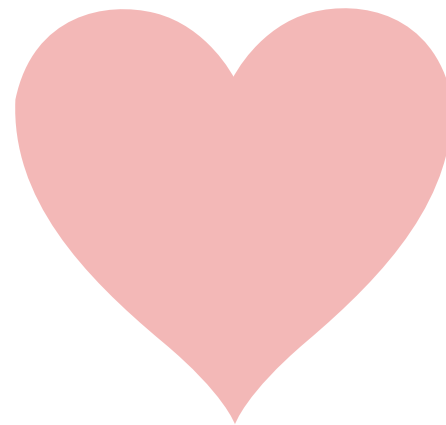
"The Grateful Heart" Guest Speaking Event

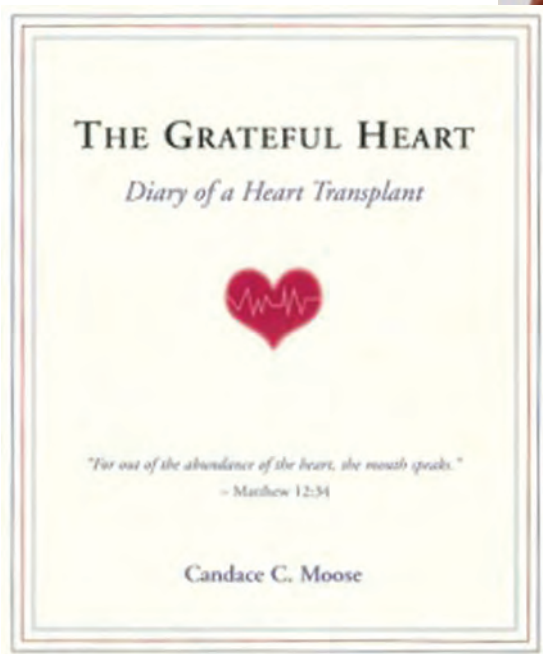

Thom's Story

It was the first day of November 2013, and life was so beautiful! My best friend (and son's godmother) of over 30 years, Jean, was visiting from Colorado with my daughter, Katie, and I in New York for the first time in over two years. She had flown in on Halloween afternoon, and we had a laugh-filled day reminiscing about everything and looking forward to spending the following evening with my 21-year-old amazing son, Thomas Dean, at his college in Fredonia, NY, where he was a senior majoring in English. Thom's birthday had been exactly one week before on October 25th, and we planned to take him out to dinner. We had the best evening I could have imagined, and Thom looked happier and healthier than I had seen him in a long time. After a difficult start in his freshman year adjusting to dorm life and all of the craziness that went with it (which he never was comfortable with), he was a senior and had an air of confidence and purpose that just filled my heart with joy! Life was good, my kids were doing great, and I was with my best friend; life couldn't be any better!

I was awakened suddenly at 4 a.m. by a phone call telling me to get to the hospital near my son's campus that was an hour and a half away. They couldn't tell me anything on the phone, and Katie, Jean, and I made that long, long drive not knowing what we would be facing but hoping it wasn't anything too serious, because we had just left him hours before, and he was fine. I was just grateful to have them with me, because if it had been any other night of the year I would have been all alone. When we arrived at the hospital, we were met immediately by campus staff and told that Thom had collapsed in his dorm room while playing a video game and was unable to be revived, and our

Thom was gone. To say that it was a shock could not nearly describe our emotions! We had just left him hours before, and he was perfect! How could my son have died and WHY??? That was the question that would plague us for over four months. We were told we would have to wait for the toxicology report, which could take up to six months, but I knew that would show nothing, because I knew my son and knew that he would barely have more than one beer let alone anything else. Finally, over four agonizing months later and after practically begging the coroner's office, we were told that Thom passed away from myocarditis, something that I had never heard of, even though I work in the medical field. Thus began our education on this sadistic killer and the many lives it has destroyed. I believe it was the efforts of a local family that

enabled us to get an actual answer, Amy and Joe Skowronski who lost their 10-year-old son, Luke, just two years before to myocarditis, who have made coroners in our state aware of myocarditis and to look for it in cases of sudden death. I will be eternally grateful to them, for not having a reason or something to fight against now would be unimaginable!

Thom was an amazing young man who touched so many lives in his 21 years. He grew up with a divorced mom and was always so exceptional and mature beyond his years in the way he looked at life and managed to be the male figure in his sister's life. I could go on for pages and pages about what made him so special, but I will just say that he was a unique young man who loved books, philosophy, acting, gaming, and making us laugh, and he touched the lives of so

many people with the extreme wisdom he had for one so young. If he had been a lesser person, he might have been a victim of bullying when he was younger, because he was always a little different than the average kid, but he always managed to find a group of extremely loyal and adoring friends whose lives he impacted so positively and in such a beautiful way that he will never be forgotten! After his death, we were able to self-publish a book with his writings and our memories of him to raise money for his scholarship fund at Fredonia, and to celebrate his life and to hopefully raise some money to fund myocarditis research, we have established a Facebook group in his honor called Team T.H.O.M. - The Heartbreak Of Myocarditis. If anyone would like to learn more about Thom's inspiring life, please join us in our group!

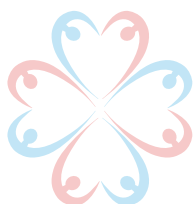

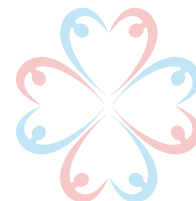
